From the President: Water, Water



What a lovely summer this has been! Temperatures in the 70s to low 80s, fantastic vegetation growth, the potential of record corn crops, and bugs galore, all due to the long steady rains this year. My wife counted 23 mosquito bites on me, three horse fly bites, and we have found ticks on just about every relative we have. I have used 30 gallons of weed killer so far, and with all this rain we've had, I am currently mowing my lawn at a rate

of two times a week. Awesome! Thank you oil companies for having the lowest gas prices in quite a few years.

All this rain has other results as well. Throughout my home inspection career, I have always talked to clients about water and homes. I have told Realtors and clients many times that I wish I had a recording of how I have talked about water, the damage it does, and the failure of homeowners to control the water. Bad grade, improper gutters, poor drive, patio and sidewalk drainage. If I had a recording, I could play the message over and over again.

My typical spiel to clients and Realtors is that the number one enemy of a home is water. I also tell them the number two enemy is the home owner who doesn't take care of the water. Then the number three enemy is a bad contractor. This gets an occasional laugh, smile, or a rolling of their eyes. Reading people's reactions is always an interesting lesson.

This year, we have been dealing with an extreme water issue in the vast majority of the state. In springtime, we saw actual pools of water in yards. Sump pumps that have never had water in them are running day and night. We're seeing dampness, seepage, and even standing water in basements that had never had a water problem before now.

Water tables are at their highest in decades. This is an extreme situation, and many home inspectors have a very real concern that every time it rains, a client will call about their own personal flood. The client may express an opinion that the inspector is an idiot, a jerk or a criminal for failing to tell them about the problem and, "If I had known about this I wouldn't have bought the house" or, "If I had known about this I would have renegotiated on the price." I'm sure many of us have had that conversation this year.

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So, how do we head off this issue? In my opinion, now is no different than any other time in the inspection business. You do your job well and make sure you cover your legal responsibilities with proper reporting language.

Be responsible, be informative, and pay closer attention to the obvious items that you know you already cover. Just hit it that much harder. Every few years, some new issue pops into the real estate business, and we inspectors face it, and get through it. You may have to be more direct in your comments, or decide to make a much stronger point in the report of water damage potential. No Realtor is going to blame you, they are seeing this too.

As always, we are the paranoid people in the business, and we have good reasons for it. Stay dry, wear bug spray, and pay closer attention to the signs of water!

I was at a WAHI meeting a couple months back, and a home inspector I have known for many years said to me, "You are pretty picky about what jobs you take, aren't you?" My response was "Yes."

I explained that I have been doing this long enough to know which jobs I will make money on, which ones I will not, which ones I will lose sleep worrying over the complexity of, and which jobs my competition will do for a cheaper price. If you want to know who is the absolute cheapest guy in the industry, I will let you know that as well. That doesn't mean they know what they are doing but, lets face it, that is what many people want. Short story on that.

Homeowner I knew well was selling his house. He got a bid from one of the worst companies in town (Company A, recommended by the relocation company) to rebuild his chimney - price \$3200. I told him I would charge \$4500. I told him, "Go with the cheaper guy. It's who the relocation company recommended and, why not, you're selling." I told the homeowner, "Do me this favor: Tell Company A that Smokestacks bid \$2800 to rebuild the chimney, but that "I liked you better, can you match his price?" I told him this company would do anything for a dollar. He called me back a few days later and told me that, not only would they match the cheaper price, they would have done the job for several hundred dollars less (I think customer felt bad that he could get the work done this cheap). I drove by as Company A was doing the work and after they were finished. I took pictures from the road. Words cannot express the lack of craftsmanship. They left the poured crown in place, took the brick off around it, put new brick in and you could see how bad it looked from 300 ft away.

This is my profession and I love what I do. I am not perfect. My body's aches and pains are not a result of doing what is easy. I tell my employees that I leave a little piece of my body at every job. They can't understand. I do prefer jobs that aren't overly stressful or without monetary reward. But when I leave the job, I know it is done right and I know it is done well. I picked it...

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
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
